






Approximate value of volunteering contribution

Policy & Advocacy

Government Relations

Volunteering Victoria maintains strong government relations through its close relationship with the Parliamentary Secretary for Volunteers and the Volunteering team at the Department of Health and Human Services. Over the past year we delivered several important advocacy engagements, including our State Election Priorities document, Parliamentarian Panel Discussion and State Budget document.

State Election Priorities

In consultation with members, Volunteering Victoria invited feedback on the priorities that should be suggested on behalf of the sector. With over 40 submissions received, we carefully distilled ideas into five major calls for action:

- 1. A whole-of-government volunteering sector policy
- 2. A volunteering-specific portfolio
- 3. Making it easier to volunteer and to lead volunteers
- 4. Build capacity for volunteer management at the local level
- 5. Providing stronger protections for volunteers in State legislation, including:
 - Prioritising work towards a nationally consistent Working with Children scheme
 - ii. Volunteering should be specifically listed as a protected area of public life in the Equal Opportunity Act 2010 (Vic)
 - iii. The Wrongs Act (1958) should clarify different types of unpaid work and provide the same protections to other forms of unpaid worker participants, as traditional volunteers.

Parliamentarian Panel Discussion

Through our relationships with Parliamentarians, Volunteering Victoria convened a very successful 2018 election discussion with four Parliamentary representatives at our AGM: Gabrielle Williams MLA (Labor Party), Cindy McLeish MLA (Liberal Party), Fiona Patton MLC (Reason Party) and Samantha Ratnam MLC (Greens Party).

When asked at the end of the Panel to offer one single pledge to the sector. Their responses were:

Gabrielle Williams

"I will continue the work of the Minister Advisory Council for Volunteers, with a reinvigorated membership that will bring together representation from all government departments and the volunteering sector. Through this new body, we will develop and implement a new Victorian volunteer strategy - mapping a pathway through the challenges and opportunities the sector has identified."

Cindy McLeish

"I will make sure that all areas of government are thinking about and promoting volunteerism and are also rapidly engaged in different forums and in National Volunteering Week."

Fiona Patten

"I commit to have performance measures on how government supports volunteering, but also commit to promoting that volunteering is not only for the people receiving the services, but also how it is good for our community's health to volunteer."

Samantha Ratnam

"I will commit to accountability and what has been talked about here and come back next year to further discuss how these commitments can be taken into action in parliament in Victoria."

State budget submission **2019-2020**

The Volunteering Victoria State Budget submission called for State investment in volunteering aligned with our State Election Priorities and the incoming Andrews Labour government Party Platform 2018. In summary, we called for investment across the sector to fund outcomes that ensure our workforce of one million volunteers remains resilient and ready to respond to current and future trends and opportunities.

In summary, we sought funding for:

- Subsidising/waiving police vetting fees
- 2. Building capacity in Victorian volunteer-involving organisations
- Support technology platforms that assist in maximising volunteer effort
- 4. Funding Volunteering Victoria + the Victorian Volunteer Support Network to develop a toolkit of resources to assess the various ways of measuring impact
- 5. Funding Volunteering Victoria + Volunteer Support Organisations to develop training and resources for under-represented sectors (e.g. CALD, environment, sports, etc.) on strategies and systems to recruit and retain volunteers



Federal and State Peak Partnerships

Volunteering Victoria enjoys a strong working relationship with Volunteering Australia and the State Peaks around Australia. With meetings held in Perth, Adelaide, Sydney, Canberra and Hobart, the energy for a strong and consistent message on federal issues is paramount to our success.

Sector Development **and Events**

Volunteering Victoria ran 25 in house training sessions and 13 Public workshops. Central to our v proposition in sector development is our broad real-world experience of programs and customised training, easily customisable to suit organisational needs.

Mentoring Program

Volunteering Victoria's Volunteer Managers Mentoring Program entered its fifth year, with 20 pairs of mentors and mentees across Victoria.

The program brings together experienced senior leaders of volunteers with entry-level managers of volunteers to assist newer volunteer managers to grow in their roles.

This program offers both professional and personal development opportunities for passionate individuals seeking to develop their skills and careers.

This year the program has 3 pairs in regional Victoria.

Justice Connect

Volunteering Victoria works closely with Justice Connect in delivering training sessions for volunteer managers throughout the year on volunteers and the law. In May 2019 Volunteering Victoria also collaborated with Justice Connect to present on one of their webinars 'Protecting your Volunteers and Organisation from Unlawful Behaviours'. Justice Connect also provides Volunteering Victoria with other support including review of guides and resources, referral and advice.

Probono Australia

Volunteering Victoria developed a webinar for Probono Australia on Coaching Volunteers Through Organisational Change. This webinar was part of our partnership agreement. Probono Australia has provided Volunteering Victoria with other support including event and content promotion.

VVSN

Volunteering Victoria supports the Victorian Volunteer Support Network by providing secretariat services throughout the year and having a representative on the executive committee. During this year the VVSN met three times, in Horsham, Ballarat and Melbourne and collaborated on a range of activities.

Our 2018 AGM 'Active Citizenship in 2018 and Beyond' was a timely reminder to explore how volunteers, as active citizens, remain integral to the well-being of our society.

Our keynote speaker Emma King, CEO of the Victorian Council of Social Services (VCOSS), delivered a powerful speech on the importance of supporting volunteering in our communities and offered her unequivocal and firm support to our Election Priorities. Emma also called for a sectorwide strategy, which aims to recognise, support and invest in volunteering.

Justice Connect also attended the AGM, endorsing our Election Priorities and will continue to collaborate with Volunteering Victoria to provide greater protection to volunteers.

Scott Miller, Chief Executive of Volunteering Victoria, facilitated an informative and robust panel discussion based on the Election Priorities.

VSS Services

Melbourne

The Department of Social Services has funded Volunteering Victoria to support the delivery of VSS services in Melbourne.

In the financial year of 2018-19 this included:

- 735 individuals received assistance to find volunteering opportunities (face to face, phone and email support)
- 471 Volunteer managers received individualised assistance
- 12 Special Interest Group Meetings were held
- 20 community talks were delivered

Gippsland

The Department of Social Services has funded Volunteering Victoria to support the delivery of VSS services in Gippsland. There was some changeover in staff in this financial year.

In the financial year of 2018-19 this included:

- 66 Individuals received assistance to find volunteering opportunities (face to face, phone and email support)
- 47 volunteer managers received individualised assistance
- 13 Volunteer Manager network meetings Across Latrobe, South Gippsland, Warragul, Wellington and East Gippsland
- 1 Community talk was delivered



Volunteering Matters increased its subscriber base by 57% to 3,718 with an average open rate of 24% and a click-through rate of 7%.






Victoria **Alive** Project

The Victoria ALIVE (Ability-Links-Inclusive-Volunteering-Everyday) project was an activity of the 2018-19 Information Linkages and Capacity Building (ILC) Transition Grant Stream, within the community awareness and capacity building activity area.

The project aims to improve disability Inclusion in the volunteering community sector.

The Project was a partnership between Volunteering Victoria and Neighbourhood Houses Victoria, with the support of the Victorian Government.

The objective of the project has been to build the capacity of the community and volunteer-involving organisations to actively involve and engage with people with disabilities.



Qualitative Research

Neighbourhood Houses Victoria lead the Victoria ALIVE research to better understand barriers to inclusive volunteering and how organisations can reduce them. The research undertaken helped to inform the development and design of the remaining project activities.

Examples of key findings informing the design and delivery of the project include:

- A gap in the development of Disability Action Plans for volunteer-involving organisations which specifically generate action around volunteer workforce disability inclusion.
- The importance of organisations learning directly from people with lived experience of disability.
- The importance of organisational leadership.
- The lack of organisational capacity and capability – which has resulted in the development (not completed) of a guide for organisations to implement a mentor / buddy program for volunteers with disability.

Training Sessions

The project held three community forums across Victoria to engage volunteering-involving organisations in an active process of identifying the barriers they face to providing disability inclusive volunteer opportunities at a regional level.

Forum attendees came from a broad range of organisations, including Neighbourhood Houses, Men's Sheds, local councils in the region, health services, disability services, community members with lived experience of disability, carers and people from a broad range of other volunteer-involving organisations.

Each community forum included a panel session in which people with lived experience of disability shared their stories and discussed the benefits and barriers to volunteering. The forums were tailored to the needs of each region and included other panel sessions such as best organisational practice or volunteers and their managers speaking about how they make their volunteering relationship work.



Next Steps

At year-end, the project was in full-swing with the research completed, and training components well under way. Into the next financial year, the team will be delivering:

- three more forums
- four micro-credentials
- a leaders' summit
- 12 guides to supporting volunteers with disability
- 6 case-study videos, and
- a comprehensive social media campaign called #WeAreAble
